- 2. Interpret compliance rates, culture changes, and practice sustainability over a six-month period.



POLICY Reference: Attire in the Perioperative, and Labor & Delivery and Procedure Areas

FAX completed tool to Quality Division at – 212-585-6860; Tools to be received weekly – by the following Monday for the prior week.

SCORING: Appropriate PPE use:

- Score YES if ALL staff in procedure are wearing appropriate surgical attire / PPE (e.g. hair and facial hair fully covered, no dangling earrings exposed, gloves worn).
- Score NO if any non-compliance observed (even if corrected); any non-compliance must be immediately
 corrected and reported immediately to the Supervisor for that area.
- · Note any non-compliance issue in the comments section AND corrective action taken

Subject: IMPORTANT: New Policy on Operating Room and Perioperative Attire

NewYork-Presbyterian is committed to providing our patients with the highest quality care in the safest environment. To achieve this goal, it is essential that our staff strictly comply with regulatory requirements and safety standards, as reflected in our policies. We have recently updated our policy regarding attire in our Operating Rooms and Perioperative areas. We want to make sure that everyone is aware of this updated policy. It is available by clicking <u>here</u> and is summarized below. Please scroll to the next page to see photo.

Attire that MUST be worn IN the Operating Room:

Scrub Suit	Hospital-laundered two piece scrub suit. Scrubs may not be brought in or worn in from home. Undergarments must be fully contained under the scrub top.		
Scrub Jacket	Long sleeved warm up jacket that is snapped closed.		
Bouffant Hat	Bouffant that confines hair and <u>completely</u> covers scalp skin, nape of the neck, and ears, including all jewelry.		
Hood	A clean hood, beard cover, or mask to cover <u>all</u> facial hair including sideburns and necklines.		
Cloth Hat	A cloth hat may be worn <u>only</u> if covered and underneath a Hospital-supplied bouffant or hood.		
Surgical Mask	A secured surgical mask, covering the mouth and nose, and that prevents venting on the sides.		
Protective Eye Wear	Protective eyewear when appropriate.		
Shoes	Clean shoes dedicated for OR use with enclosed fronts and backs, and without perforations. They may not be worn outside the Hospital. If not dedicated for use in the OR, <u>Shoe Covers must be worn</u> over shoes, as described above.		
Sterile Gown & Gloves	Sterile gowns and gloves, as required.		

Attire that <u>CANNOT</u> be worn <u>OUT</u> of the Operating Room:

Surgical Mask	Surgical masks must be <u>completely</u> removed. They cannot drape or dangle.
Shoe Covers	Must be removed.
Cloth Hat	Must be removed if not covered by a <u>Bouffant Hat.</u> A Bouffant hat may be worn out of the OR.
Sterile Gown & Gloves	Must be removed.
